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Madison Racich, presented by Chief Sommers. 1 2 Chief Sommers advised the Board (BOD) that citizen Madison Racich 3 took matters into her own hands and saved a life. 4 5 Chief Sommers turned the meeting to Captain Quinlan. 6 7 Captain Quinlan stated, 8 9 It is with immense gratitude and admiration that we present this 10 commendation for the Citizen Lifesaver Award to Madison Racich. In 11 a world where acts of selflessness and courage are rare and go 12 unnoticed, Madison exemplified the true essence of a hero by 13 stepping forward and making a profound difference in the life of 14 another. 15 16 On the 16th of June at 8:02 in the evening, Madison demonstrated 17 unparalleled bravery and quick thinking that undoubtedly saved a 18 life. Two men were swimming to the buoy line and back at Ski Beach, 19 when one had trouble staying afloat and submerged. His exhausted 20 friend shouted for help to the shore. In that critical moment, Madison 21 did not hesitate to act. While others called 911, Madison jumped in 22 the lake and swam out to assist the submerged man and his friend 23 into a passing boat. Madison showed courage and maturity beyond 24 her years and acted quickly to save his life. Without her assistance, 25 I am convinced this would have had a much worse outcome. 26 27 The Citizen Lifesaver Award is a symbol of appreciation for individuals 28 who exhibit the highest qualities of compassion, bravery, and 29 selflessness. Madison has more than earned this accolade through 30 her remarkable act of courage. Madison's courage serves as an 31 inspiration to us all, remining us that one person's actions can truly 32 make a difference. 33 35 36 to inspire us all to lend a helping hand to those in need. 37

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Madison's actions remind us of the profound impact that individuals can have when they rise to the occasion. May her example continue

All guests remained present for the duration of the 5 6 meeting. 7 Discussion of and Possible Action, to adopt the Assembly Policy, 2. 8 presented by Chief Sommers. 9 10 Chief Sommers referred to page 21 of the BOD packet stating NLTFPD 11 wrote a policy that we did not have due to the current public 12 assembly with local politics that is occurring with another agency. 13 Chief Sommers stated the district felt a designated area to assemble 14 was needed as we cannot and do not want to turn people assembling 15 down because we would be infringing on their First Amendment 16 Rights. 17 18 Chief Sommers advised he worked with Chair Herron and came up 19 with the policy on July 2nd, as it had to be in use July 3rd. Chief 20 Sommers said all had gone well with the policy and said it was 21 handled as an emergency approval however it is now being brought 22 back before the BOD for adoption. Chief Sommers reiterated this an 23 additional policy that NLTFPD did not have before, and he is following 24 the format to have the Board adopt it. 25 26 Chair Herron asked if there were any questions for Chief Sommers. 27 28 Director Miller inquired on if the policy had counsel review. 29 30 Chair Herron confirmed and stated that if there were no questions, 31 she would entertain a motion to adopt the assembly policy as 32 presented. 33 34 Secretary-Treasurer Bremer summoned the motion to adopt the 35 assembly policy as presented. 36 37 Vice-Chair McKay seconded the motion. 38 39 Chair Herron called the question. 40 41

*Fire Chief Report presented by Fire Chief Sommers.

Chief Sommers reported the following:

*Board of Directors Comments or Report:

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Attended the Lake Tahoe Summit on August 9th in North Tahoe (NT). The Summit was well attended.

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Met with California United States (U.S.) Senator Alex Padilla one on one to talk about issues in the basin and said it was a great experience.

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Attended Senator Cortez-Masto's lunch at University of Nevada Reno (UNR), where he spoke with Senator Cortez-Masto and Senator Jacky Rosen, adding they are very much interested in keeping the Lake Tahoe Restoration Act going and renewing it for Fuels work in the future as well as learning about additional funds for Wildfire Enhancement out of Senator Cortez-Masto's office but that is to be determined.

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Chief Sommers also spoke to them about the ALERT Wildfire Camera System, trying to have specifically the Tahoe cameras better software in the existing software.

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38 39 The evacuation drill was held on August 16th and believe it went very well. It was a great collaboration between all kinds of agencies. Chief Sommers stated there will be more to come on the evacuation as he will be attending a meeting tomorrow on 9th St. and Wells on the existing plan because a lot of citizens in Incline Village, Crystal Bay and now Reno, are questioning preparedness because of the Hawaii fires. Tomorrow's meeting will address and put together a plan for the community.

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Public Information Officer (PIO) Rancourt, Fire Marshal (FM) James and he are working on forum for October at the Chateau on nothing but evacuations, to present to the community evacuations. Chief Sommers added that Kelly

Echeverria will be there and advised he will be letting attendees know from the start it will on its best behavior the entire time and if the nay sayers show up, it will be shut down as he will not put up with the non-professional attitudes of some nay sayers as this is important, as this will save lives and people need to be quiet, pay attention and their questions will be addressed professionally.

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Chair Herron inquired on the date of the forum.

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Chief Sommers said the date is being determined and that is why it is tentative and is really based on availability of the Chateau and advised he would provide more information as it becomes available.

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Lastly, Chief Sommers moved to give a presentation for another award that although not on the agenda, is very much needed. Chief Sommers turned the meeting over to Lu Sweeney.

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Lu Sweeney and Lisa Douglas, Rotarians of the Noon Club, stated they are here to formally share an award that has been awarded to one of the NLTFPD Battalion Chief's (BC's), in honor of the entire department in 2021. Ms. Sweeney stated that as Rotarians of the Noon Club, they have a fundraiser every year called known as the Duck Drop and explained the event. Ms. Sweeney stated she and Ms. Douglas were President and Co-President during the Pandemic and the Caldor Fire and said that even with through those two massive events', the Rotary had some normalcy by continuing the Duck Drop to raise money to give back to the community, BC Sambrano was such wonderful, normalizing, welcoming BC that assisted for successful events. Ms. Sweeney referred to the screen and said the picture is the Rotary Citizen of the Year Bench located at the corner of the Chevron station and said the bench now has a plaque for BC Sambrano, Rotary of the Year, Citizen of the Year. Ms. Sweeney added that C-Shift will be assisting in the Duck Drop Fundraiser over Labor Day weekend and extended an invitation to everyone. Lastly, Ms. Douglas stated BC Sambrano also gave credit to everyone on shift and was very gracious.

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*Chief Officers Report presented by Assistant Fire Chief Barnum.

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Assistant Fire Chief (AFC) Barnum reported the following:

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Emergency Medical Services (EMS), AFC Barnum reported Paramedic (PM)

Courtney Kollasch, present today, finished her PM task book. FF/PM Kollasch

was the first employee he hired when he became AFC and said he tried

something that had not been done in 12 years, which was hiring someone as a Firefighter (FF), put them through PM school, and then the rigorous program that the district has for PM's. AFC Barnum reiterated FF/PM Kollasch has since completed both programs and congratulated FF/PM Kollasch on the accomplishment.

PM Refresher is scheduled for November 29th, 30th and December 1st, at the Hyatt in the Lone Eagle Lakeside Ball Room.

Mt. Rose Ski and NLTFPD will collaboratively put together an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) refresher saying has not been done for several years. The refresher will not only benefit the wildland hand crews but also ski patrollers, it will be free, and will help the patrollers and hand crews with obtaining Continuing Education (CE).

Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) audit is due November 30th and thanked Captain Quinlan and everyone else involved and advised the district will do fine in the audit.

Dispatch, a new three-year contract was signed for dispatch confirming we will continue with Grass Valley Emergency Command Center (GVECC).

Fleet, GMC chassis has been ordered and is due to arrive sometime at the end of the year, followed by 90 days to upfit.

Training for the month is focused on confined space, and crews will be using a donated structure on Dorcey Dr. AFC Barnum stated he is thankful to the individuals in town who donate structures because a lot of different things can be done in them.

Staffing, three individuals were hired with a start date of Monday, August 28th. Two of the new hires were hand crew members, one for Slide Mountain the other for Rifle Peak, and the other is coming to us from Care Flight. The new hires are all PMs, and they will be attending the Academy from September 11 through the later part of December. AFC Barnum expects them to be fully functional around January.

PM Kokenge and PIO Rancourt worked to secure an Assistance for Firefighters Grant for \$80,000 for automated CPR devices. AFC Barnum recognized this is something that we have needed in the district for a while because of things like our transport times and CPR fatigue. AFC Barnum stated the district started 11 years ago as the First Hear Safe Community in Nevada and this is building on and showing cardiac survival is important.

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*Chief Financial Report presented by Chief Financial Officer Signorelli.

Chief Financial Officer (CFO) Signorelli advised the finance report was included in their BOD packet but wanted to not the following:

Accounts Payable (AP) report has voids on June 1st and was related to Great Plains (GP) system going down.

Workers' Compensation (WC) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-2024, CFO Signorelli continues working with Nevada Public Agency insurance Pool/Public Agency Compensation Trust (Pool/PACT) as they have been a little lax in their notifications to us. CFO Signorelli clarified this was not the case with Davies the Third-Party Administrator (TPA) as they do a fantastic job, however she is not obtaining anything from Pool/PACT. CFO Signorelli reiterated she is working with Pool/Pact as well with Specialty Health, as originally there was a big lack of response. CFO Signorelli is working to obtain an After-Action Report (AAR) quarterly to understand if they are fulfilling the promises made to the district in May.

CFO Signorelli recognized Administrative Assistant Andreina Quiroz for being instrumental and doing phenomenal work on WC, and that Andreina stepped in, called providers directly, dealt with Davies, employees directly, going above and beyond, to make employees could be seen immediately.

CFO Signorelli also recognized Tracy Collins in payroll, as she has been working tireless, making improvements, efficiency changes and advised the payroll deadline will be pushed to Wednesday 11:30 a.m. rather than 5 p.m. to avoid last minute changes.

A Human Resource (HR) Consultant is being sought although a full-time (FT) accountant was approved in the budget. However, after going through the Information Technology (IT) Assessment with Eide Bailly, CFO Signorelli would like to push that off to see where the holes are.

Director Miller commented that he was disappointed to hear about POOL/PACT given that they gave quite a presentation, it is an expensive program, they talked a lot about supporting the crews and the programs they had. Director Miller stated hearing about the issues CFO Signorelli is having is frustrating and he is looking forward to hearing about what is going on.

CFO Signorelli agreed and spoke about the protocols, gaps, and delays in scheduling appointments the district has phased. CFO Signorelli expressed her disappointment in POOL/PACT as they have not returned her call and said the worst-case scenario is she will reach out to Chief Sommers and Chair Herron

Mr. Racich first expressed being very proud of Ms. Racich and said that living in this wonderful little village, the personal support his family has received

from the Fire and Police Departments over the years has been amazing and thanked the department.

Mr. Racich added he, his wife Holly, and their five kids lived in Incline Village since 2012, and recognized the great support the district offers the community.

Mr. Racich asked Ms. Racich to share the series of events that occurred on the day of the water rescue. Ms. Racich said the day of the rescue, she had gone to the beach with her best friend Katie Fuller, as they were about to eat, she heard someone yell out for help, Mr. Racich took off her shoes and ran into the water to assist. After assisting, she spoke with the FD then went home with Ms. Fuller and recapped with her parents and PIO Rancourt about what had happened at the beach. Later that night, Ms. Fuller went home, called Ms. Racich, and told her that the man Ms. Racich had saved was her uncle. Ms. Racich stated that being able to save Ms. Fullers' uncle that evening had come full circle for her as she and Ms. Fuller were involved in a vehicle accident a year ago and said it is a miracle that she is alive.

Mr. Racich stated everything had come full circle and said he was taken aback by that story.

Director Miller congratulated Ms. Racich for the well-deserved reward as other kids may have reacted differently. Director Miller stated that having the instincts and ability to act is commendable.
